- (f) listen carefully effective listening is a skill which takes effort, practice and experience;
- (g) reduce victim(s)/witness(s) anxiety by:
  - (i) ensuring privacy;
  - (ii) gaining rapport, trust and respect;
  - (iii) being polite while maintaining control;
  - (iv) offering refreshments and the use of a phone;
  - (v) letting the victim/witness take a break, if required;
  - (vi) using language appropriate to the witness' level of understanding;
  - (vii) avoiding judgemental or personal comments;
  - (viii) ensuring from the onset that the victim(s)/witness(s) is aware of the Victims Services Program and other counselling services which are available; and,
  - (ix) providing the victim(s)/ witness(s) with an interpreter, if necessary; and,
- (h) follow-up on interpretive comments such as, "he was huge," or "he looked like a truck driver";
- (i) if the witness has already provided a description of the suspect, review same; and,
- (j) pay attention to auditory cues, including what the suspect said, how they said it, if they had an accent, etc.
- Officers shall be prepared to deal with other problems which they may encounter when interviewing witnesses and victims.
- The O.I.C. of a case shall, where practicable, utilize an Officer who has completed the "Ontario Police College Investigating Offences Against Children" course when dealing with child witnesses.

## Y. Collection and Preservation of Physical Evidence

- 1. Investigators shall be aware of the value of physical evidence in solving crime. Physical evidence is defined as anything deposited at a crime scene or on a victim or which verifies contact between a person and the crime scene or victim.
- 2. Properly handled, physical evidence is a powerful investigative aid in criminal identification and prosecution. When physical evidence is found, investigators shall:
  - (a) ensure the protection and collection of such physical evidence; and,
  - (b) when required, request assistance from Forensic Identification Services personnel.
